

IF YOU HAVE EXPERIENCED DOMESTIC VIOLENCE, DATING VIOLENCE, SEXUAL ASSAULT, STALKING OR OTHER VIOLENT CRIME, YOU SHOULD:

IMMEDIATELY GO SOMEWHERE SAFE and report the crime by calling 911.

PRESERVE ANY EVIDENCE to aid in the investigation and prosecution. This may also be helpful in obtaining a protection order.

- Refraining from washing bathing, showering, or douching, if possible.
- Refrain from washing clothes or other items worn/used during the incident.
- Do not delete text messages or emails.

SEEK MEDICAL CARE. Although you have the right to receive medical care at any Emergency Department that you choose. More information on medical forensic exams is available at www.sacasa.org.
